Steps for online citation:

- 1. Google your subject to find credible sources online. URLs ending in .edu, .gov and .org tend to be better (but not always).
- 2. Go to that website and pull a quote about your subject that supports your notion that he/she is a role model, hero or whatever title you chose. Example for Alexander the Great: <a href="http://www.history.com/topics/ancient-history/alexander-the-great">http://www.history.com/topics/ancient-history/alexander-the-great</a>. Quote taken from that page: "He is regarded as one of history's brilliant military leaders and most powerful rulers."
- 3. Paste that quote into a word doc.
- 4. Open a new browser and go to <u>www.EasyBib.com</u>. Paste the URL from your source into the top box and click on "Cite it."
- 5. It will take you to a page that tells you what info it has and what info it's missing. Click on "continue."
- 6. On the new page, can you fill in the missing info? Author? Go back to your original browser page and see if you can get more info. After you fill in all you can, click "Create citation."
- 7. Copy that citation into your word doc and save it. Example: Foner, Eric. "Alexander the Great." *History.com.* A&E Television Networks, n.d. Web. 12 Nov. 2014.
- 8. Do the same steps to find a second online citation to support your claim of role model, hero, etc. Paste a quote into your word doc and make another citation for it.
- Find a counterargument online something that tells you your celebrity is NOT a role model, etc. Again, copy a quote and make a citation to add to your word doc. You will use all three quotes/citations in your essay.
